



February 2- Titus 2:11-15

Grace-The freely given, unmerited favor and love of God.

Read Titus 2:11-15

1. What does “the grace of God” refer to in verse 11?
2. How does grace “train us” according to verse 12?
3. What is meant by “our blessed hope” in verse 13?
4. Why is it important that Christ “gave himself for us” as stated in verse 14?
5. What does it mean for believers to be “zealous for good works”?
6. Why is it important for Titus to “declare these things” with authority in verse 15?
7. What does the passage reveal about the relationship between grace and good works?
8. How does Titus 2:11-15 challenge the way we live our daily lives?
9. What role does the second coming of Christ play in the Christian life, according to this passage?
10. How can we live in a way that reflects the truths of this passage in our community or church?

February 9- Titus 3:1-7

How often do you need to remind yourself of something? Why do you think that is?

Read Titus 3:1-7

1. What does it mean to be submissive to rulers and authorities there in verse 1, and why should we?
2. Why is it important to “speak evil of no one” and “avoid quarreling” as mentioned in verse 2?
3. In verse 3, Paul describes the former life of believers. What is the purpose of this reminder?
4. What does Paul mean by “the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior” in verse 4?
5. How does God save believers, according to verses 5-6?
6. What is the significance of being “justified by his grace” in verse 7?
7. What does it mean to be “heirs according to the hope of eternal life”?
8. How do verses 4-7 demonstrate the generosity of God’s grace in salvation?
9. How should the understanding of God’s grace in salvation affect the way Christians live?

February 16- Titus 3:8-15

1. As you were growing up would you consider yourself a trouble maker or a peace maker?

Read Titus 3:8-15

2. What is the significance of Paul's statement "The saying is trustworthy" in verse 8?

3. What does Paul mean by "devote themselves to good works" in verse 8?

4. Why does Paul warn against "foolish controversies" and "genealogies" in verse 9?

5. What is the danger of "dissensions" and "quarrels about the law" mentioned in verse 9?

6. How should the church handle a person who "stirs up division" as stated in verse 10?

7. Why is it important to "have nothing more to do with" a divisive person after two warnings (verse 10)?

8. What does Paul mean by saying the church should "devote themselves to good works" again in verse 14?

9. How do good works relate to the faith of believers, according to this passage?
